El Mercado (The Market)

Learning outcomes

» Looks at the beliefs, customs, ceremonies, traditions, and social practices of varied cultures, drawing from folklore. (Grade 1)

Books we read

Activities we did

We played 'In Grandmother's Basket...', a game to help us learn the Spanish names of some fruits and vegetables that originated in Central and Southern America.

Everybody sits in a circle and the first kid holds the basket and puts in an item of food (see list below). He or she says "In grandmother's basket there is(food item).

The next kid picks up another item and puts it in the basket, saying "In grandmother's basket there is ...(first food item) y ...(second food item).

Go around the circle until everyone has had a turn. Here are some Spanish names for foods:

Chocolate - Chocolate	Vanilla - Vainilla
Peanuts - Cacahuates	Sweet potato - Camote
Pineapple - Piña	Red pepper - Chiles
Potato - Papa	Рарауа - Рарауа
Avocado - Aguacate	Tapioca - Tapioca
Bell peppers - Pimientos morrones	

Today's craft: Mini Carreta



In Costa Rica there is a tradition of going to market in an ox cart called a *carreta*. People have been decorating these *carretas* for over a hundred years. The decoration shows which family the cart belongs to, and they are now part of any fiesta or parade.

You will need:

- » Cart template (see at-
- tached) » White cardstock
- » 2 yogurt pot lids

Directions:

1. Print or draw the template onto cardstock and cut out sections marked with large 'x's'.

» Crayons

»Sticky tape

»2 butterfly clips

- 2. Color the sides of the cart and the wheels (lids) you can copy the pattern from a real *carreta* (see website on next page) or make up your own.
- 3. Crease along the sides of the cart, fold and tape.
- 4. Push the butterfly clips through the center of the wheels and through the small 'x' on the side of the cart.
- 5. Spread the clips out so that they are flat against the inside of the cart.

An introduction to the process of making chocolate, from the time the farmer plants a cocoa tree to the time someone eats a piece of candy.

Takes a look at chocolate as a crop. Provides information about cultivation, harvesting and processing of the cacao nut into the final product known as chocolate.

Describes the development of the potato, including information on planting seed potatoes, sprouting, the growth of the plant and its underground tubers, and the role played by tubers in the life of the potato plant.

A photographic collection exploring what the world eats featuring portraits of twenty-five families from twenty-one countries surrounded by a week's worth of food.
