Learning outcomes

- » Students know different animals inhabit different kinds of environments and have external features that help them thrive in different kinds of places. (Grade 1 Life Sciences)
- » Students know animals eat plants or other animals for food and may also use plants or even other animals for shelter and nesting. (Grade 1 Life Sciences)
- » Plants and animals have predictable life cycles. (Grade 2 Life Sciences)
- » Students know examples of diverse life forms in different environments. (Grade 3 Life Sciences)

Activities we did

- » We talked about the different ways caribou are adapted to living in the Arctic.
- » We examined antlers and horns and talked about how they are similar and different.
- » We examined specimens from walruses and talked about how their different physical characteristics help them survive.

Today's craft: Caribou Puppet



You will need:

- » Paper lunch bag
- » Glue
- » Brown construction paper
- » Googly eyes

» Pencil

» Black marker

» Scissors

Directions:

- 1. Trace your hand on the construction paper two times and cut each one out. These will be the antlers.
- 2. Glue the antlers onto the back of the paper bag.
- 3. Fold bottom corners of flap under, to create a face shape.
- 3. Glue on googly eyes and draw nose and mouth.
