Documenting dead marine mammals helps scientists determine causes of mortality and spot emerging diseases, allowing them to monitor the health of and identify threats to marine mammal populations along the California coast.

If you find a dead marine mammal, document it using iNaturalist:

1. Download the *iNaturalist* app and make an account.
2. Take multiple photos of the organism. Refer to the information in this guide for what photos to take to help with identification.
3. Tap “what did you see” in the observation form and use the suggestions or add your own identification by typing it in. If you’re not sure of the species, type in a high level ID, like “seals” or “dolphins” or even “mammals.”
4. Save and upload the observation to share with the iNaturalist community and the Academy’s Marine Mammal Stranding team!




